### A Sermon Series for This Moment in Time

We live in a moment of significant societal unrest and turmoil precipitated by the present pandemic and centuries of social injustice perpetuated against people of color that remains unaddressed and unresolved. Does our faith provide any guidance in a time when wisdom and clear direction is crucial to move us through this moment to justice and hope and peace and renewed community life?

The Ten Commandments may seem like an unlikely guide for such a time as this. Often the commandments have been misunderstood and misappropriated during our lifetimes by religionists who brandish the commandments to control people rather than liberate them. Yet the Ten Commandments were originally given to a community that had been enslaved for 400 years (an echo of which we hear the 400 years of black oppression in America) in order to provide new patterns of justice and peace and dignity and responsibility. The Ten Commandments equipped this newly freed community with a divine pattern they could live into to establish equity for all.

Mark Diehl will offer a twelve-week sermon series on the Ten Commandments beginning August 9. While the series is based on Mark Diehl's book *God of Deliverance and Transformation: The Ten Commandments for the Twenty-First Century*, purchasing or reading the book is not necessary in order to benefit from the series. Mark is providing a study guide for the congregation to use during the series which can be found and downloaded from GPMC's website. You are encouraged to read the scripture and engage the questions from each week's study prior to the sermon. This week will be Study #1. All sermons will be recorded and broadcast at 9 am on Sundays, and can be found on the website or our YouTube channel.

**Thank you for your on-going support of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church!** In these challenging and uncertain times, your unwavering commitment to GPMC continues to power our “Light by the Lakeshore”. The burdens on local food banks are more overwhelming than ever, GPMC partner organizations have far fewer volunteers, and none of these important groups can fundraise via their usual events.

But with your giving, now and throughout the rest of 2020, GPMC will continue to support these stressed, faith-based organizations financially so they can maintain their vital work, despite the virus. Within the walls of GPMC, we will continue to provide meaningful programs and outreach – be it virtually or otherwise – that enable us to witness as fully as possible God’s love. Ongoing Christian Education efforts will make sure our children know there is always love and hope, even in a world that often demonstrates to them otherwise. “Livestream” Worship will continue to bring us together at a time when we seem far too apart, separated by space, lacking human touch, and seemingly divided as ever in America. Our Music programs continue to provide us a beautifully poignant and emotional release from the concerns that fill our days. ## OUTREACH



Our neighbors in the 313 area code have been among the most affected in Michigan, documenting half of the state’s deaths from COVID-19 and facing 50% unemployment as of June 2020. To help, GPMC is joining

with other Presbyterians to become a Matthew 25 church (<https://www.presbyterianmission.org/ministries/matthew-25/>) and make a difference in peoples’ lives. We aim to work with the community to perform 313,000 acts of kindness over the next year. Look for a special communication to share more of this vision soon!

## In Celebration of Jim Biery's 10 Year GPMC Anniversary

August 1st will mark Jim Biery's tenth year as GPMC's Organist and Minister of Music. In celebration, several choir members have contributed thoughts and memories. Jim was asked for some thoughts as well, but decided to go with what the choir shares. Seems a bit risky to me. Hard to control musicians once they get started, especially when they've been pent up for so long and have, in essence, each become soloists in order to contribute to remote Sunday morning hymns and anthems. Soloists are known for their independent thoughts and actions, but OK.

I share the first memory, well, because I can. I wandered into GPMC shortly after Jim started. I heard the choir and knew I had to join, very excited to sing with such a great choir. I never post on Facebook, but did this time, announcing to my friends that I had joined a great choir and was now singing for James Biery. Liz Spry, a local organist and choir director for decades, replied asking if he was "the composer." What? I googled him. He was and is! "Tell him I love his music," was her quick reply. Oh, don't we all!

Dan Aggas, on the other hand, recognized Jim immediately. "I was working in Fellowship Hall and noticed two people walking down the hallway. I looked, waved to them, and thought to myself, THAT guy looks familiar. About 10 minutes later I realized who it was because I'd seen his picture on the backs of music we'd been singing at Jefferson Avenue Church, the organist there being a fan of both the Bierys. Jim was there for an interview. How lucky we would be, I thought to myself, to get them at GPMC."

Suzanne Grogan, soprano soloist and section leader until winter when they moved to Grand Rapids, tells about moving back to Michigan from Louisiana and looking for a section leader position. She emailed 10 music directors in the Detroit area; nearly everyone ignored her. Jim was the only person who invited her to audition even though he had no openings. She left somewhat disappointed, but he followed her to her car and created an opportunity for her that summer and then, of course, many during her tenure with the choir. She's grateful for the opportunities he gave her, for his direction and his leadership.

Chris Bauder, former tenor soloist and section leader, recalls Jim's audition rehearsal from 10 years ago, being "really impressed with Jim's approach to choral warmups, with an emphasis on listening to each other for blend." Well, that and how exciting it would be to have a resident composer. And, Chris wanted me to mention the total awe he and the choir have every Sunday as we watch Jim play the organ. "Jim is clearly the best these ears have ever heard."

"How we have grown as a choir and an ensemble under Jim's direction" is what strikes Pete Larson. "The things he's challenged us with (Bernstein's "Chichester Psalms" comes to mind) and others that have made me love choral singing even more. He makes me want to do more, sing better, do my best even though he doesn't verbally demand that. I always look forward to rehearsals and services."

Karin and Jeff Colvin told of their visit to a church in Fort Collins, CO. They were barely seated when the choir assembled near the altar and began performing a piece they recognized: a James and Marilyn Biery composition. After the service, they loudly announced to their daughter and all within hearing that they knew the composers. "So, thank you, Jim and Marilyn, for sharing your gifts and for all that you do."

Sheena Law-Killinger began singing with us in 2014. "It has been a pleasure to have found a place where I can use my musical skills at a high level for the glory of God," she says. "I think what I have appreciated most about Jim is the pairing of high quality and talent, with his heart being sincerely behind his work." It's rare that you find the total package. "Jim is so gifted but also sincere and it shows every Sunday. You can see how the music is chosen carefully to match the sermon and the texts and how carefully he puts concerts together."

I reached out to Kypros Markou, Professor and Director of Orchestral Studies at Wayne State University, and a frequent violin soloist and organizer of instrumental players for our special events. Maestro Markou says he has been "blessed for the last 6 or 7 years with the opportunity to be part of many performances at GPMC under Jim's direction. He is a wonderful musician. I greatly appreciate his skills and knowledge, and his tasteful concepts of the music. He really inspires and enables musicians to come together and play their best. I appreciate and enjoy his compositions and was thrilled when he performed the Bach keyboard concerto with us! But not only is he a terrific musician; he is a very kind person. It's always a joy to work with him."

Sheena actually closed her contribution with the thoughts that we all have. "Jim is a deeply personal person and doesn't toot his own horn." His medical journey in 2019 allowed each of us to see how much his work really means to him and his belief in the healing power of music as part of his faith. "It was a blessing to see him lean into this over the past year and to pour his concern into worship. I think the whole congregation could feel that."

Our sincere thanks to the search committee for picking him! Jim told me a few years ago that he will stay at GPMC until we don't want him anymore. I hope that's still true. Dan Aggas and I are each compiling a very long list of all the pieces we want him to play at our funerals.

Below is an update on communion and in-person worship services at the direction of the Session of GPMC. As we return to these important patterns in our life of faith, there are many things that will feel comforting and familiar, and there are things that will be different. We trust that the Holy Spirit is at work in our midst as we move forward together in ways that will protect the most vulnerable.

**Communion** will be offered during the pre-recorded worship service next Sunday, August 16, so that we can safely share in this sacrament from our homes. You can access pre-recorded services from our website. Whenever you watch the worship services, please come prepared with some kind of bread and with “fruit of the vine” – juice or wine, your choice! The liturgist will bless the elements and then invite you to partake, knowing that the Spirit unites you with our Lord, our church community, and with Christians around the world as we share this sacred moment in new ways.

**In-person outdoor worship** has begun at 5pm on Trinity Terrace with much joy! We expect to have this worship service every Sunday that weather permits us to be outside. Prepare for heat and sun! **Please make yourself comfortable by wearing cool clothing and bringing a hat or umbrella and a water bottle.** Seating is limited to 50 people. In order to protect our staff, community, and congregation, this will be different from our typical 5 pm service in several ways:

**1. Reservations are required for attendance and special parking.** Reservations will open the Monday prior to worship at 9 am and will close at 4 pm each Friday. Reservations can be made either online through our church website (see the green button on the bottom right side of this page) or by calling the church office at 313.882.5330 Monday through Friday between the hours of 9am to 4pm. We will have a waiting list and may announce additional changes to our reservation process if more people would like to attend than we are able to accommodate. There will be 5 reserved parking spots for people who are at high risk. Each spot is for 1 vehicle to worship from within your car. **Please note, several handicap spots are also available near Trinity Terrace. No reservation is required for these spots.**

**2. Arrive 15 to 20 minutes early.** Before entering Trinity Terrace, your temperature will be taken, and you will be asked a few questions regarding your current health status. While waiting for your turn, please practice social distancing in the parking lot.

**3. Seating with social distancing will be practiced based on your reservation.** Chairs will be prearranged to accommodate your reservation with the understanding that seats will be placed far enough apart to minimize virus transmission. **Do not move chairs that are already in place.** If you need additional seating, please acquire additional chairs from the garage area.

**4. Entering and exiting Trinity Terrace.** Please enter and exit Trinity Terrace through the large gate next to the Little Club and be mindful to continue social distancing. At the end of worship, all participants will be dismissed in an orderly way by the worship leader. Please wait for your row to be called.

**5. Masks are required.** All participants over the age of two years are required to wear a mask.

**6. Worship Participation.** Worship practice will not include the use of printed bulletins or song books. We will not have congregational singing. Music during worship will only be instrumental. Communion will not be offered. Passing of the Peace will not include physical contact.

We look forward to welcoming you to worship, gathering as a community, and seeing one another face to face. If, however, you are at high risk for COVID-19, we encourage you to take good care of yourself and worship from home. Our pre-recorded weekly worship will continue to be available online and can be accessed through our website. These worship services are released at 9am every Sunday. Whether we worship virtually or in person, we trust that God hears our prayers and unites us into the one body of Christ.
