We are a member of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and one of its growing congregations. A Sermon Series for This Moment in Time

We live in a moment of significant societal unrest and turmoil precipitated by the present pandemic and long-standing, unresolved discrimination against citizens of our country. Does our faith provide any guidance in this time when wisdom and clear direction are needed to move us toward justice and hope and peace and renewed community life?

One of the valuable treasures of Jewish and Christian faiths is the prominence given to scripture: it is often referred to as the word or words of God. For some, the “word of God” denotes demand and restriction; for others it connotes challenge and courage; still for others it conveys reassurance and comfort and succor. One perspective highlighted in Jewish scripture is God’s word, God’s Torah or Law, as that which leads the faithful into wisdom and understanding and knowledge.

Our theme for the fall program year of 2020 is “Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path” (Ps 119:105). When faith communities attend God’s word by reading and studying and meditating on its meaning and significance, and implement its wisdom, those communities are led to wholeness and fulfillment, righteousness and peace.

The focus of sermons in worship through the end of October will sharpen that theme centering on the Decalogue or the “Ten Words,” otherwise known as the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:1-17). The Ten Commandments were given to a community that had been enslaved for 400 years in order to provide these newly freed people with relevant patterns of justice and dignity and responsibility. Understood properly, the commandments can guide us in our challenging moment in time as well.

Mark has provided a study guide for the congregation to use during the series which can be found and downloaded from GPMC’s website. You are encouraged to read the scripture and engage the questions from each week’s study prior to the sermon. This week will be Study #5. All sermons will be recorded and broadcast at 9am on Sundays, and can be found on the website or our YouTube channel.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Children's Sermons for the month of September will focus on going back to school using the themes of hope, finding time for rest and prayer with studying and activities, friendship and knowledge.

Youth Groups for middle school and high school students are done meeting for the summer! We'll see you again on September 15 at 7pm as youth group starts up for the school year. Due to the ongoing pandemic and changes in the public schools, our programs look a bit different this year. 5th and 6th grade students at GPMC will be part of a new youth group called FLAME, which stands for Fellowship in Love And Ministry Everlasting. This year, FLAME (5th and 6th grades), LIFE (7th and 8th grades) and TUXIS (high school) will continue to meet regularly on Tuesday nights from 7-8pm, even when the weather turns colder. Since many of our young people will be on computers all day for school, we are trying to facilitate a youth program that allows for in-person interaction while mitigating the risks. We're going to meet on Trinity Terrace dressed for the weather, with masks and social distancing. We'll have a fire pit for each group to gather around to help everyone stay warm. During our meeting we will share our highs and lows from the week, read a Bible verse and discuss it, play some active games, and pray. If the weather is really terrible, we'll meet online for a similar program via Zoom. Change and uncertainty are hard for everyone. Our prayer is that GPMC continues to be a place of support, connection, and real relationships for our youth in this season.

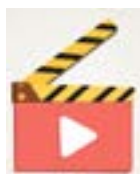

Congregational Conversations: The Mission Study Team continues leading our congregation's self-study and is learning about our community. We are moving toward the culminating Mission Study Report that will be submitted first to our Session, and then to Presbytery's Commission on Ministry for approval. The Mission Study Report will be informed by the six key activities of our mission study: Congregational Gatherings, Congregational Survey, Financial Review, Demographic Study, and Community Study. **Thank you to those who participated in our Congregational Conversations** and in helping to discern God's voice and mission for our church. Our process involves careful and prayerful consideration of who we are and who God is calling us to be, as well as the identification of our collective experiences, gifts, passions, perspectives, and the strengths and needs of our community.

Unfortunately, we are not collecting returnables at this time. Many of you have been very generous about donating your cans and bottles to our youth mission trip fundraisers in years past. Thanks to your generosity, we've raised about \$2,000 a year in support of our youth mission trips at home and abroad. This year our mission trip planning is on hold as we wait to see if a vaccine will be widely available by next summer, so we don't have a team of youth to handle returnables. Sabbatical Leave: Sarah Godbehere, our Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families, will be on an extended professional leave from September 16 - December 16. GPMC's extended professional leave policy allows for 12 weeks of leave for renewal and professional development after six years of full-time ministry, much like the sabbaticals offered by other institutions. Carol Marks, Lisa Turner, Jim Biery, and Peter Henry have all received extended professional leave since the establishment of this policy. Sarah Godbehere was granted this leave by the Session at its June meeting. Sarah will spend this time as a "sabbath-ical," engaged in study and experience of the Biblical practice of sabbath rest. She will be out of the office, away from her email, and unavailable for pastoral services and duties during her sabbatical. We wish Sarah rest and renewal and we are thankful for the wonderful staff and youth program advisors team who will keep everything moving in her absence.

In-Person outdoor worship service at 8:30am on Trinity Terrace begins today, Sept. 6. in addition to the 5 o'clock service. As with the 5pm service, we expect to hold this service every Sunday that weather permits us to be outside. Seating will be limited to 50 people and registration is required. There will be 5 reserved parking spots for people who are at high risk. Each spot is for 1 vehicle to worship from within your car. **Please note, several handicap spots are also available near Trinity Terrace. No reservation is required for these spots.**

The congregation of GPMC is quickly moving into its next phase of the interim process. Leaders of the History-to-our-Story Team and the Mission Study Team are concluding their work. A mission study produced by the MST will soon be in the hands of the Session, and, with their approval, into the hands of the Presbytery of Detroit. A date for completion of this process could be as early as October. When this phase is complete, the next step will be the election of a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC).

In anticipation of this next phase, the Session has received approval from Detroit Presbytery to begin the process of assembling names of people who will be considered, vetted, and nominated for election to the PNC at a congregational meeting. At this point, our Nominations Committee can receive from the congregation suggestions of names of members who are recommended for consideration to serve on the PNC.

So, during the month of September, you may forward name suggestions to the Nominating Committee who you believe could represent the congregation well in the pastoral search process.

Who would be a good candidate to suggest for the PNC? Here are some criteria:

- Active member in the life of the congregation
 - o Participates in worship regularly
 - o Engages in bible study through Sunday School or small group
 - o Financially supports the church
 - o Volunteers and leads
 - o Engages in mission outreach
 - o Spiritually sound, wise, and grounded
- Familiar with the people and attitudes and values and mission of GPMC
- Works well in a group and with a group process, contributing progress to the group's agenda and goals
- Shares several of the skills needed by the PNC, including:
 1. Leadership of group process
 2. Analytical and insightful
 3. Spiritually sensitive
 4. Theologically and biblically informed in the Reformed Tradition and Presbyterian policy
 5. Good judge of character/people
 6. Writer/wordsmith
 7. Familiar with GPMC Mission Study
 8. Articulate
 9. Able to listen to, and respect, differences of opinion
 10. Willing to offer alternate ideas even if novel or unpopular

- Will devote the time required for the demanding task of serving on the PNC

An Update from Mark Diehl, Interim Pastor, Head of Staff August 19, 2020

“How long will this go on?”

That is a reasonable question among all of us whose patience is legitimately stretched by precautionary restrictions imposed by Covid-19 prevention. And as we all are aware, the answer is unknown as to when a safe resumption of normal life can return. All of us want it to be soon, and some of us are willing to take more risks than others to engage a “more normal life” now.

At the same time, many people have resumed life as if no pandemic exists, or they never took it seriously to begin with. The results of disregard for public health protocols are surfacing in the widespread surges of C-19 in the South and in rural areas, once considered “exempt” from the disease. Colleges attempting to return for fall classes with in-person instruction and residential living on campus are rolling back those expectations because of outbreaks. Tentative attempts to return to some sense of normality are being undermined by the perniciousness of this contagion.

A few innovative and experimental approaches to childcare and early childhood education are being implemented in the US; these focus on limited risk exposure by class size restrictions and careful separation of groups into “pods” which remain together with the same teacher and children and room and equipment, and do not intermingle with any other pod or physical area. Using these educational- and health department-approved protocols, our Mornings At Memorial program will attempt reopening September 14.

“What is the plan for GPMC?” people want to know.

The plan determined by the Session at its June meeting remains in place and, after nearly two months of implementation, seems wisely prepared in retrospect. For those who may have missed the publication of these plans, here is a summary:

- Worship will continue to be offered indefinitely by remote recorded and/or streamed video through our website at 9am Sunday mornings.
- Communion will be resumed (and has now restarted). It is scheduled to be observed the first Sunday of every month from this point on.
- Trinity Terrace may be used for in-person gatherings provided that specific health protocols and restrictions are followed. Maximum number of persons allowed on Trinity Terrace is 50. Several GPMC groups and outside groups are using the Terrace now.
- Outside groups may be permitted and scheduled to use Trinity Terrace provided they comply with church requirements and restrictions (see requirements and restrictions immediately below). The church office will coordinate these requests.

- Requirements and restrictions for attendees at any in-person event held on the property: practice social distancing, wear masks, answer relevant health questions, have temperature taken, and provide info for contact tracing.
- Events threatened or interrupted by inclement weather on Trinity Terrace will be cancelled.
- A 5pm Worship Service was authorized (and has resumed).
- Baptisms will be considered for the 5pm service, or if necessary, as a small group inside the facility which will be recorded and included in the following Sunday’s recorded service as part of the liturgy.
- Any wedding or funeral schedule for Trinity Terrace will be permitted inside the building in the event of inclement weather, adhering to strict limits on number of persons and health protocols.
- No dates for a projected return to in-person worship or educational events within the church facility or the opening of the church offices were determined. Return dates for in-person use of the church facility will be assessed in light of current conditions.

A concern among all of us in this period of isolation is preserving and encouraging connection and community as much as is safely possible. To that end, an additional outdoor morning worship service is being explored for the remainder of the warm weather season, as well as other events and studies that bring people safely together for interaction and fellowship. If you have other ideas for accomplishing this, please direct them to our staff and our council leaders.

The interim committees continue their progress and we expect the completion of their tasks later this fall. Once that is complete, Presbytery will authorize GPMC to form a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) and the search for the new head of staff will commence.

The Nominating Council will make its report later this fall and elders, deacons, and trustees will be elected and positions on the Councils will be filled. Our Outreach Council and the 313 Calling team continue to address needs within our community through food drives and other opportunities for support. A Stewardship Program, along with budgeting for 2021, will be scheduled. Sunday School Classes will kick off in September.

I hope you are challenged by our Fall theme “Your Word is a Lamp to my Feet and a Light to My Path,” and engaged by the series on the Ten Commandments along with the study guide offered on GPMC website. God’s word feeds our souls and directs our paths in all we encounter along our journeys.

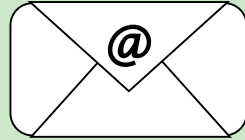

1 Find a place inside to set your cell phone horizontally. So it is stationary while recording. Friends may have trouble holding the phone steady.



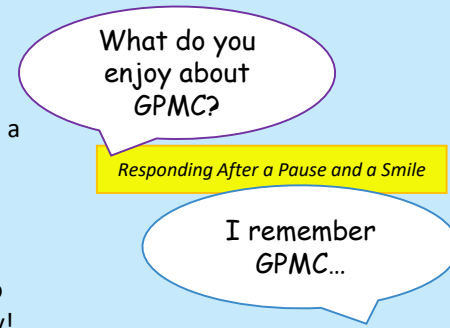
2 Make sure you are standing or seated in a way that your head is in the center of the video and that there are no windows or lights behind you.
